Celebrating A Generous Harvest

Harvest is a special time for our churches; a time for joyful gratitude. With well-loved traditions of decorating the church, our harvest gifts and sharing a Harvest Supper we celebrate God's harvest abundance. In harvest worship we give thanks for the richness of God's creation and our gratitude reminds us never to take this gift for granted.

Harvest is also a time of generosity. We share the harvest gifts to support our foodbanks or in giving harvest gifts to those who are not forgotten.

This harvest-tide, just as Jewish tradition does, our bible readings and sermons will explore the OT book of Ruth. This short and beautiful story pulls no punches. All human life is here: bereavement and grief; poverty and anxiety; the struggles of two widows and male concerns of land and family name; hard words and honest faith when God seems not to care.

Ruth is also a rich tapestry of faith, hope and love and transformational generosity. We read about Naomi's generous prayer and planning for a better life for Ruth in the midst of her own deep grief. We read about Ruth's extraordinary generosity of heart, acting freely, decisively, boldly, wanting no life that excludes Naomi. We read about Boaz, whose generous integrity provides for the two widows.

Reading Ruth will encourage us to explore our own, personal journey of generosity. It will help us have better conversations around money matters and resourcing the life, ministry and mission of our churches. Above all, Ruth will invite us to think afresh of God's grace-filled generosity and how, in a small town called Bethlehem, God graciously gifts bread to a hungry people, a king to Israel and a Saviour to the world.

Consultation Update Holy Spirit

Those involved in PCCs in COHL parishes will remember November 2022. The draft proposals from the Right Buildings Team had been circulated and we were all frantically searching for the fate of our own church. At Holy Spirit our hearts sank; both our church and hall had been earmarked for closure.

We had actually been thinking for a while about our buildings and, let's not be coy, we were struggling to keep them both going. We were keeping up with our regulatory compliance, but anything else that had been identified on the Quinquennial Report as requiring attention was causing us an issue.

Holy Spirit has never been a church with investments or large legacies so any large financial outlay has always been difficult. Add to this the vast increase in utilities since Covid and also the fact that we rose to the Diocese's request to maintain Parish Share throughout Covid with no rental income from our hall, and our meagre savings had taken a battering.

In the aftermath of the report, we immediately started to think of alternatives. Both buildings were closing, so where could we meet? Also if we had no hall, we had no income so how could we rent anywhere to meet? Those who know Holy Spirit know that our worship is based around the Eucharist so a suitable meeting place had to be conducive to our style of worship.

It quickly became apparent that our only option was to accept the Right Buildings

Team's recommendations and to accept full closure.

Now, this is the Church of England, and this was never going to be a simple nor quick process and there have been times when we just wished it was all over. After much consultation and consideration the Church Commissioners Pastoral Measure was passed with no objections and so now Holy Spirit, which has served the people of Dovecot for 92 years will close in a few months.

The path has been very sad. Since Covid, the numbers returning to our church have been regularly in the low teens. Those who remain now need to find a new "home". The sadness has also been tinged with anger and frustration, not least when we found our church building advertised "for sale" on Rightmove - even before the Church Commissioner's decision was known. This was obviously accidental, but didn't help our feelings at all.

But all is not final; the PCC continues, and the church hall will remain open for the immediate future, to allow the many community groups to continue to meet. Beyond that, we'll wait and see.

And so Holy Spirit will close the church doors for the last time on **Sunday 6th October**. We will hold a **10:30am** service of Eucharist and Thanksgiving on that day. *Please make a note of the date in your diary and EVERYONE is welcome to join us to celebrate all that Holy Spirit has stood for and to thank God for all who have worshipped and spread the gospel in Dovecot throughout the years.*
